

January 2017

Welcome back everyone to 2017 and I am sure another eventful year for health in Hawke's Bay. Having spent the last few weeks away with my family to visit friends and our families in the UK, it has given me a chance to catch-up and think about another busy year ahead for 2017. It has also offered me the opportunity to be thankful for the healthcare system we experience here in New Zealand, and as employees of a DHB. We are very fortunate to have a stable system whereby management and governance work cohesively together to ensure the best possible outcomes for those in our care, where we champion professional development to ensure we continually improve and advance as best we can and where management structures remain fairly consistent. In the UK my former colleagues have reminded me that things are much different and fragmented, with structural changes every few years, causing uncertainty and instability, and where pay scales no longer reflect those of counterparts abroad.

## Industrial action

First-up the year began with the challenging junior doctors strike affecting 18 district health boards including Hawke's Bay. The event kept many of our staff busy over the Christmas and New Year holiday period contingency planning and prevented many from taking annual leave or having to rearrange it.

The 73 hours of strike action from 17 January until 20 January was again well-managed. The contingency planning meant that even with many of our junior doctor workforce on strike, the senior doctors and nurses were able to cover shifts so we could maintain life preserving services. However a number of outpatient clinics and elective surgeries were postponed and have had to be rescheduled. This has affected many in our community. To those people I can only apologise. We are doing our best to reschedule and get everyone back on a list as soon as we can. I understand that this will have been enormously frustrating and upsetting for those who were preparing themselves for surgery or preparing to have an outpatient clinic only to have it postponed. I hope the issues can be resolved with no further action.

## Corporate restructure

At the end of last year I released my final decision on the corporate services restructure (insert link to nettie). We have begun advertising for the new positions of Executive Director of Strategy & Health and Executive Director of Primary Care and have received internal expressions of interest for the two new positions of Executive Director of People and Quality and Executive Director of Corporate Services. These people will be interviewed before we consider whether we need to advertise externally. The changes to Corporate Services will come into effect from 20 February.

## Te Matatini National Kapa Haka Festival 22-26 February

Forty eight teams from 12 regions throughout New Zealand will converge in Hawke's Bay for this hugely popular bi-annual Kapa haka competition at the Hawke's Bay Sports Park, Hastings. The four- day event is hosted by Ngati Kahungunu and will be a cultural festival and a pinnacle event for Māori performing arts. Thousands of people from all around the country attend the event which this year will be a chance for Ngati Kahungunu to showcase Hawke's Bay. Our public health teams will be there in force promoting various health messages and services. This whanau friendly, smoke and alcohol free event, I expect, will be more of an opportunity for us all to witness kapa haka excellence.

## Endoscopy Unit

This year we will begin building our new \$11.8 million Endoscopy Unit that will help give us the ability to be able to provide bowel screening services for our community next year. The building will adjoin the main entrance to Hawke's Bay Hospital and work will begin early this year with the unit due for completion by August next year

On 1 March we will officially open Waioha, our low risk natural birthing centre which is midwifery-led and delivering on expectations from staff, Lead Maternity Carers and, most importantly, women and whanau. We did not want to squeeze this very important event into already full calendars.



## Napier Health Update

Plenty of activity is happening at Napier Health with Alexander Construction on site to carry out improvements/upkeep to the exterior of the building and space being booked by our Security Team for security training sessions, assisted by local police. The training, for all DHB staff, gives advice on dealing with inappropriate or aggressive behavior.

Also, future planning of 'virtual oncology clinics' is also underway between Napier Outpatients and Mid Central DHB. This videoconferencing link is often known as 'Telemedicine', brings health care access to different locations by enabling health practitioners to evaluate, diagnose and treat patients remotely using the latest telecommunications technology. The benefits of this technology allows many patients that find it difficult to travel to clinics, to still get access to care.

## Opening of Health HB

An early morning welcome on Monday 30 January was given to Health Hawke's Bay staff as they started working from their new offices on the first floor of the DHB corporate office building. The blessing by DHB Kaumātua, Māori Health and Chaplaincy services saw staff from Health Hawke's Bay and the district health board celebrate the move and acknowledge the benefits of developing even closer working relationships.


We've heard your feedback about parking issues at Hawke's Bay Hospital and we've listened!

Our Go Well Travel Plan is taking shape and in 2016 we introduced some great new initiatives such as:

- The introduction of express bus services timed to meet the needs of shift workers.
- The launch of new commuter services linking Napier, Taradale, Hawke's Bay Hospital and Hastings.
- From 1 January, free GoBay bus transport for outpatients and their caregiver/support person to attend appointments at Hawke's Bay Hospital and Napier Health.
- Walking and biking maps went online – with bike racks available at several locations within hospital grounds near to most common entrances.

## Changes to Car Parks

Remarking of our car parks took place in late December, early January in preparation of our next Go Well phase which will see the introduction of paid parking in the future. There aren't any changes at this stage, other than you will notice there are different coloured parks which will soon be allocated to particular patrons – for example: visitors, staff and staff who carpool.



Signs are being installed and once everything is in place, the paid parking programme will be introduced. This is to further encourage people to consider alternative forms of transport to our hospital.

A nominal fee of \$1/day for staff and \$1/3.5 hours for patients and visitors will go back into the Go Well budget to supplement future initiatives and facilities to encourage people to bike, walk and ride the bus. Those registered as car poolers may park for free.

Please note: Plenty of notice will be given to staff and visitors before paid parking is introduced.
